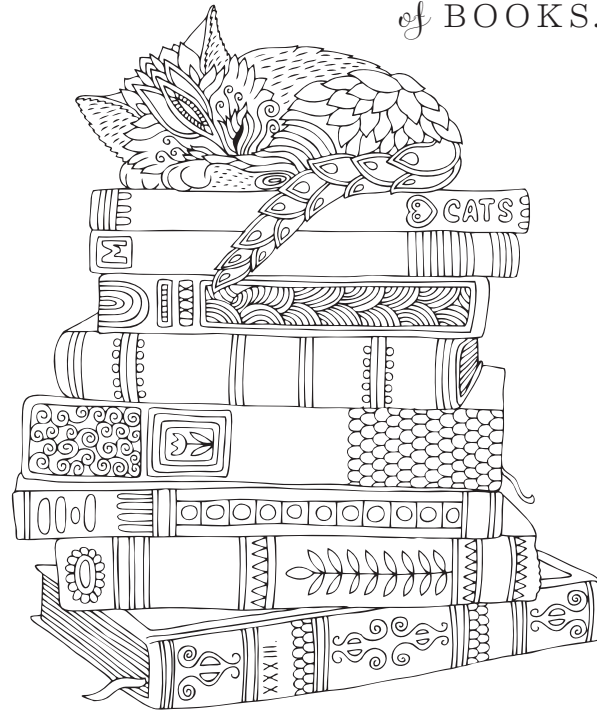


Neighborhood Arts

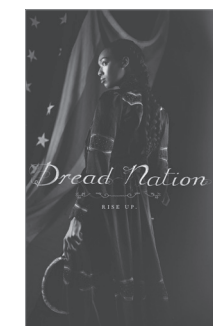
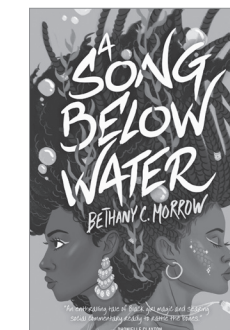


The Belles by Donielle Clayton
