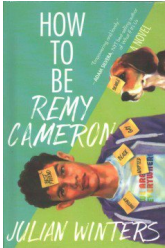


Cemetery boys

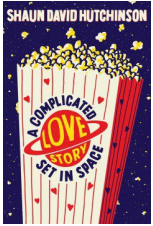




Kings, queens, and in-betweens

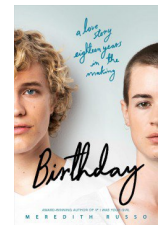
A society wife-in-training has an uncomfortable awakening about her strictly polarized society after being recruited into a band of rebel spies and falling for her biggest rival.
