From Our Executive Director

ast year, public libraries from every community in the United States were called upon to respond to a plethora of community impacts: COVID-19 and the corresponding health care crisis, a national financial crisis with unprecedented job losses, and social unrest in response to calls for social justice in our communities. Public libraries became the center point of community responses by supporting accurate counts in the US census; supporting remote work and learning; providing access to governmental information and resources to aid those harmed by severe weather and business / employment setbacks; providing resources and services to aid community members facing life's challenges; and facilitating participation in our elections.

The Metropolitan Library System was one of these public libraries supporting their communities in a time of need. MLS began by providing social media content to aid our customer's transition to digital library services the day after we were forced to close due to COVID-19, even though there was no infrastructure in place to do so. We then began supporting remote work and online learning and recreation. MLS responded guickly to the communities needs by immediately transitioning its operations to support the new demands of customers and introduced new technology (the Metro Check Out app) to aid in safe and convenient materials pick up by the customer. Access Services began by modifying customer access to the collection by providing curbside pickup, bonus bags, extending Library by Mail program activities, and offering curbside printables highlighting services and resources available to the customer. Departments and staff shifted quickly to offer virtual programming within a matter of days of our closure in March. The speed at which new services and programs were offered can be witnessed by our nationally recognized

Virtual Children Reading to Dogs program which got off the ground in 10 days. Systemwide engagement generated online thematic programming and takehome activity kits were quickly added to support our customer's needs in education and enrichment.

MLS also worked to support our online community and keep it connected to our real-world community of service. We found new ways to interact with our customers and meet their needs in the dynamic changing environment that was COVID-19. The library supported community groups and movements in meeting community and social needs. We worked with the OKC StorySLAM to offer monthly programming online through special partnerships; historic walking / cycling tours were created to match customers with our resources in new interactive ways; created a 2020 guilt at Southern Oaks to commemorate the year; offered our Author Hour program online fostering interactivity with customers; and offered online interactive health programs such as yoga and tai chi. Summer and Winter Reading were completely transitioned to a virtual format while still maintaining a connection to our customers.

MLS is now a more dynamic and flexible organization that can meet the changing needs of our customers more effectively both in-person and online. We are proud of the staff and their work that has made our transition so effective in this effort. We wish to thank all those whose time and contributions have made us successful in our new digital world of library service.

In the heart of a pandemic, but primed for the future

As a public library system, we depend on the community relationships we build at every library branch, and throughout our system. We are grateful for our volunteers and for our community partners, the Friends of the Metropolitan Library System and The Library Endowment Trust.

Our connection with the Friends goes back to their founding in 1978. The Friends of the Library raise funds through their members and through the sale of used and donated books and materials. Those funds are then granted back to the libraries.

February 2020 was the first time in over 40 years when the Friends were unable to hold their large annual event. Still, their volunteers maintained their online Amazon storefront and operations as much as they were able. As a result, the Friends were still able to make grants to support the library, including scholarships to help MLS staff members continue their education and funding for summer reading prizes across the county.

The Library Endowment Trust has been our community partner since 1986, when the Trust was established by the Friends of the Metropolitan Library System as a way for people to give to the library and to designate funds to help meet future library needs. The Trust raises funds each year through community appeals and by hosting an annual fundraising dinner, Literary Voices[®]. Due to ongoing pandemic concerns, the Trust again postponed this signature event, which is now planned for September 2022. Because loyal donors have helped to sustain and grow the Trust, the Library Endowment Trust has been able to do more for our libraries. The Trust recently gifted \$950,000 to help with building state-of-the-art meeting rooms in the new Belle Isle Library. This gift from the Trust was made possible by a planned gift from Gordon E. and LaVerne Taylor. We look forward to celebrating this gift with the Library Endowment Trust when Belle Isle opens in 2022.

Relationships continue to be at the heart of our work. Volunteers are crucial to help us deliver great service and programs to our customers. While we took volunteering virtual for most of the past year, in coming months we will offer opportunities throughout our locations.

Community partnerships are also vital in helping us provide more for customers. During this pandemic year the library system participated as a pick-up location for Oklahoma City Museum of Art's Free Family Days. Five of our locations (Almonte, Capitol Hill, Ralph Ellison, Southern Oaks and Del City) distributed hundreds of free art kits in February and June 2021 because of this partnership. Similarly, we were able to provide free online classes in English as a Second Language and Citizenship due to our relationship with the Community Literary Centers. These classes are taught on zoom by CLC instructors and have helped us to better serve the community in our work together.

Primed for the future

While the health of our community is still on the mend, we're looking to our future with some great new libraries and services.

New Libraries(-ish)

Spring 2022 can't come fast enough for the Belle Isle Library community. The library's renovation construction is scheduled to end in early spring with the grand opening following shortly after. This renovation is the first major remodeling effort for the library since it opened in 1963. The renovation includes an additional 10,000 square feet of space for a much larger meeting area, study rooms, children's programming space, a dedicated teen area and an MLS Studios makerspace.

Plans are also in the works for a new Almonte Library in southwest Oklahoma City. Construction is slated to start in fall 2022 and the building is scheduled to be complete in late 2023. The new library will be about 20,000 square feet and will feature a public meeting room, children's programming space, an MLS Studios makerspace, study spaces and more. It is being built for flexibility and technology. We are also looking into a feature that holds lockers that can be accessed after normal library business hours. The new library site is just around the corner from the existing site at SW 59th Street and May Avenue.

Not exactly a new full-service physical library, but we recently built our first "Metro Library To Go" kiosk in Edmond's Mitch Park. The 24-hour kiosk contains books and materials to check out and allow for customers to get their holds and return books. It is our first drop off/pickup site just for holds.

A Pandemic Won't Stop Us!

Libraries take pride in being safe, welcoming spaces at all times and especially during times of crisis. COVID-19 made gathering indoors unsafe. Out of concern for the safety and well-being of library staff and the communities we serve, we closed the doors for programming and book browsing in our physical buildings for much of the fiscal year. Closing our doors did not mean we were absent in our communities, but it created a unique opportunity to find new ways to serve our customers and communities.

While most of our in-person and physical services were unavailable while we were closed, we extended online renewal policies, expanded online checkout services and added virtual programming and services.

After returning from our closure in March and April, our libraries expanded to provide more in-person services such as curbside pickup, take-home kits, bonus bags and public computer access.





Metro Checkout App

Looking to improve the customer experience and continue our popular curbside service, we launched the Metro Checkout app in January 2021. The free, easy-to-use app allows curbside customers to check into their library upon arrival. Customers can enter the description of their car, what spot they're parked in and information about bonus bags or take-home kits they expect to pick up, and Library staff will drop those items off to them. The app also lets you conveniently checkout books right from your phone. Just scan the book's ISBN code and just like that, the book is checked out to you! The app, available for download in your app store, allows customers to retrieve holds for members of their family who have separate library card accounts.

Children's Materials Go Fine Free

This fiscal year we sought to improve access to our materials for our youngest customers. Starting July 1, 2020, we removed all overdue fines for children's materials and established a policy of no more late fees for them. Historically, children's overdue fines amount to less than 0.1% of our budget. As a result, they have little impact on library operations.

Fine Free for All

Since launching our fine free policy for children's materials in July 2020. we heard a chorus of approval from our customers. This led to adopting a one-year pilot program or trial period of going fine free for all adult materials in July 2021. "Fines are an obstacle that disproportionately impacts families without the means to pay," said Chris Kennedy, MLS deputy executive director of public service. "We have a responsibility to make our materials available to as many people as possible. Removing these fines, while still requiring the items to be returned, will allow more customers to enjoy our materials for education and enrichment."

These Experience Passes turned out to be a very popular service, and we have already solidified partnerships with two other museums in the metro area. In November 2021, we added the Oklahoma History Museum and its affiliated historical museums and sites as well as the Skeletons: The Museum of Osteology (think skulls, skeletons and bones!).

OKC StorySLAM

Starting in May 2020, the library partnered with OKC StorySLAM to provide monthly storytelling events through Facebook Live. Founded by a current staff member of the Oklahoma Arts Council, OKC StorySLAM has been a community tradition since 2005. Participants tell personal stories off a chosen theme. All stories must be true, told without notes, and told in seven minutes or less. With the pandemic, StorySLAM was not able to hold its live monthly events, so our library coproduced online events that gave local storytellers a virtual audience.
